Many, many thanks to everyone who played a role in our joint worship service with Trinity Portland and St Stephen's East Haddam on August 10th to celebrate the ordination to the transitional diaconate of Maggie Labinsky. Particular thanks to our Altar Guild; to Linda Napoletano, Ted Williams, and choir members from the three churches; our Zoom team, ushers, readers, acolytes, and chalice bearers. And special thanks to everyone who provided salads and tea sandwiches at the reception. We were blessed with many folks from Trinity and St Stephen's who read lessons, served as chalice bearers and oblation bearers, sang in the choir, and provided starters and desserts for our celebratory feast. So many attended that we ran out of chairs in the parish hall! Collegial gratitude for the Rev. Joanne Neel-Richard, the Rev. Erin Flinn, the Rev. Mary Anne Osborn, and the Rev. Deacon Maggie Labinsky. What a glorious morning it was!

What is a Transitional Deacon?

A transitional deacon is an Episcopal man or woman ordained as a deacon a step toward becoming a priest, typically serving in a parish for a period of several months to a year before priestly ordination. This sacred order is considered a preparatory phase, imbuing future priests with a deep understanding of service and configuring them to Christ the Servant, a dimension of their ministry that continues into the priesthood. Transitional deacons perform liturgical duties, such as proclaiming the Gospel and assisting at Mass, and carry out pastoral acts of service.

Key Characteristics:

- **Preparatory Stage**: The primary purpose of the transitional diaconate is to serve as a final step in preparation for the priesthood.
- **Ontological Change**: Upon ordination, a transitional deacon receives a permanent configuration to Christ the Servant, which permanently shapes their identity as a minister.
- **Parish Assignment**: After ordination, a transitional deacon is typically assigned to a parish for practical experience under the guidance of a priest.

Roles and Responsibilities

Transitional deacons assist the presiding priest, proclaim the Gospel, deliver the homily, and prepare the Eucharist. They are involved in acts of charity and serve the community, embodying the servant model of Christ. They have pastoral duties and help connect people to the church and the wider world. The main difference is the vocational path. Transitional deacons are on their way to the priesthood. Permanent deacons, in contrast, are ordained to the diaconate as their final calling and do not typically go on to become priests.





In conjunction with the Autumn Leaves Fair, the church will be conducting a Bake Sale and a Fall Harvest Sale on Saturday, November 8th from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

In addition to baked items we would like to include canned items like pickled beets, jams, jellies, tomatoes, tomato sauce, pickles and any other items you have canned from your gardens. Now that canning season is in full swing please put aside a few jars for the church's sale.

Winnie Edmonds has volunteered to take charge of the sale and will be contacting individuals to solicit items for the sale.


From remarks made by Robert F. Kennedy at the Cleveland City Club on April 5,1968, the day following the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

"Our lives on this planet are too short and the work to be done too great to let this spirit [of hatred and revenge] flourish any longer in our land. Of course we cannot banish it with a program, nor with a resolution.

"But we can perhaps remember - even if only for a time - that those who live with us are our brothers, that they share with us the same short moment of life, that they seek - as we do - nothing but the chance to live out their lives in purpose and happiness, winning what satisfaction and fulfillment they can.

"Surely this bond of common faith, this bond of common goals, can begin to teach us something. Surely, we can learn, at least, to look at those around us as fellow men and surely, we can begin to work a little harder to bind up the wounds among us and to become in our hearts brothers and countrymen once again."

As of August 2025


Pledges for August were \$8,583,00, over budget by \$226.42. Year to date pledges stand at \$68,845.00, over budget by \$1,992.36.

SEEKING MEMBERS

Bobette Reed Kahn and I are planning on starting a study session for anyone interested in learning more about The Daughters of the King. I have copied a few paragraphs from the handbook and study guide (permission is on the title pages of both) to give yo u a little more background.

Several years ago there was a Chapter formed here at Christ Church, and we would like to restart it and make it active again.

From The National Handbook and Bylaws, 2024, The Order of the Daughters of the King:

The Order of the Daughters of the King is an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it.

Today The Order's membership includes women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA), and Roman Catholic churches. The Order was founded in 1885 by Margaret J. Franklin at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in New York City (now the Church of the Resurrection). The Anglican tradition of The Order includes episcopal (bishop's) oversight, recognizes that Holy Scripture contains all things necessary to salvation, acknowledges the gift of the Holy Spirit in Baptism, the real presence of our Lord in the Holy Eucharist, and worship according to *The Book of Common Prayer* or the standard liturgies of Lutheran, Roman Catholic, or other Anglican churches that sponsor chapters.

Members undertake a Rule of Life, incorporating The Rule of Prayer and The Rule of Service. By reaffirmation of the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a life -long program of prayer, service, and evangelism, dedicated to the spread of Christ's kingdom and the strengthening of the spiritual life of her parish.

From The National Study Guide of The Daughters of the King:

The National Study Guide, consisting of twelve sessions, will help you explore your faith and learn about The Order of the Daughters of the King®. Each session asks challenging questions and leads to an understanding of The Order. Meeting regularly for study and prayer offers the best opportunity for deepening spiritual growth and building community among current and future members.


50 cookies for \$10.00

As you enter the church from the parking lot and step down into the church, the first stained glass window on your left was dedicated to the memory of John Stewart. He was born on February 10, 1795 and died on September 16, 1860. He was 65 when he joined his maker. He's buried at Union Hill Cemetery in East Hampton.

John was an American merchant and politician who served one term as a U.S. Representative from Connecticut from 1843 to 1845.

Biography: Born in Chatham, Connecticut, Stewart completed preparatory studies. He became engaged in shipbuilding and in the mercantile business in Middle Haddam.

Early political career: He served as member of the Connecticut House of Representatives in 1830, and in the Connecticut State Senate from 1832 to 1837.

He served as judge of the county court of Middletown, in Middlesex County, Connecticut.

Congress: Stewart was elected as a Democrat to the Twenty-eighth Congress, serving from March 4, 1843 to March 3, 1845. He was an unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1844, to the Twenty-ninth Congress.

Later career: He thereafter resumed shipbuilding pursuits, serving in the state senate again in 1846, and in the state house of representatives again in 1854.
